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

'The Scriptures teach that we are immersed in a
world that continues to reveal the presence of the
divine Word.

Jesus often refers to God's care for the birds of the
air and the flowers of the ground as examples of the
care that God holds for even the most passing of the
things of nature.

The entire creation is upheld and sustained in the
continuous love of God its creator, energizer,
sustainer and completion. This love extends from the
existence of the smallest particle of star dust, through
to the mysterious laws that govern the universe, to
the creation of humans with free will and radical
choice.

In Christ, this love is made more fully manifest to us.
In the incarnation through the life, death, and
resurrection of Jesus we see just how completely all
that is human, all that is matter, all that comprises
the forces of the universe, are incorporated within
the divine dance.

From within the incarnation we can take up two of
the great paradoxes of creation. First, all material
things are created in love and are loved in their
nature as matter. All creation goes through cycles of
change across time, and nothing escapes entropy or
death or re-energizing or re-emergence. This is the
cycle of matter and its transformations. The second
paradox is the part that humans play in creation.
God respects the freedom in which we are made and
holds all things in love, even though we may fail to
love creation itself.

An insight into the work of Toto Olita, Lay Carmelite from Perth who is a researcher with the Centre for Crop and Disease Management at Curtin University....

Toto's current work explores the economic impact of plant diseases on a sustainable agricultural production system. **Did you know** that plant diseases cause significant economic damage with a global estimate of \$220 billion losses annually according to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO)? The Physical Science of Climate Change: Some humanitarian insights from the latest IPCC report ... Pablo Suarez, Erin Coughlan de Perez, Miriam Nielsen, Maarten van Aalst

Climate Change is strange. Making sense of what is happening requires an enormous, analytical collective effort. More than 200 scientists from 66 countries have worked together to assess knowledge on just the physical science basis of climate change. Their answers were released recently in the Sixth Assessment Report (AR6) by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) Working Group I.

The IPCC's findings are clear, rigorous, and very concerning. They are captured in formal, technical language. Now we need to speak about the report's implications, in language(s) everyone understands.

The unprecedented is the new normal

The IPCC says: "The scale of recent changes across the climate system as a whole and the present state of many aspects of the climate system are unprecedented over many centuries to many thousands of years." In other words the past is no longer a useful guide for the present: in this new normal, we should expect what we have never experienced before.
