Preparing to hear the Word

We have been called by God to be the Church, the Body of Christ in this world. We are not a building, but a people, gathered and grounded in the Word of God, the love of Christ, and the unity of the Holy Spirit.

God of life,

prepare us anew to be bearers of your Spirit.

Scripture Reading (John 14:15-21)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If you love me keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you forever, that Spirit of truth whom the world can never receive since it neither sees nor knows him; but you know him, because he is with you, he is in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come back to you. In a short time the world will no longer see me; but you will see me, because I live and you will live. On that day you will understand that I am in my Father and you in me and I in you. Anybody who receives my commandments and keeps them will be the one who loves me; and anybody who loves me will be loved by my Father,

and I shall love him and show myself to him.'

$Reflection {\it - Promise of the Spirit, bond of love}$

As we approach the coming feasts of the Ascension and Pentecost, the Gospel today focuses on the Holy Spirit.

Jesus returns to the Father in the Ascension, but remains with his disciples through the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. This Holy Spirit keeps us in a communion of love with Jesus, with the Father and with one another.

The commandments of Jesus are always about love - love of God and love of neighbour. Those who live by these commandments of Jesus abide with him, others and the Father in love.

Along with the call to love comes a gift to help us, to accompany us on our journey, lending knowledge, courage and a deep experience of God's life and love.

Jesus is the reign of God in person. He is both the image of God and the model of the redeemed human being that each of us is called to be.

The Gospel makes a number of important points: the basis of our relationship with Jesus is love; Jesus' return to the Father does not leave us orphans because his spirit, the Spirit of truth, the Advocate, will be with us always; Jesus will, one day, return.

The whole Gospel reading today is like a love poem. God's love for us, shown clearly in the life of Jesus, draws us into love with him and one another and allows us to share God's life both now and for ever.

May the new life we celebrate over the next fifty days bring us the creativity of Spirit we need to be the living heart of God in our world today.

Prayers of Intercession

Help us to feel more deeply the presence of your Spirit in our hearts.

For those who bear the scars of hurt and neglect, make us your comfort and love.

May we cherish your love in our hearts and be your love in the world.

For all those missing family and friends, make your presence known to them.

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Lord's Prayer

Formed by the teaching and example of Jesus, we pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Closing Prayer

Lord, God, in the resurrection of Jesus you share with us his risen life.
Transform our darkness, fear and isolation with your comforting presence so that we can be your calm, loving, healing presence to each other.
Through Christ our Lord.

Bless with a place at your eternal table those who fed and nurtured our life as it was formed within them.


Bless our mothers today with good things and with health; with joy, love and laughter, and surround them with many good friends.
