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Sign of the Cross

In the name of the Father, and of the Son. and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

We stand in your presence, O God; and we praise your holy name.

May your mercy be upon us, O Lord; as we place our trust in you.

Show us your mercy and love; and grant us your salvation.

Preparing to hear the Word

Like the money changers in the temple many things clamour for our attention, claim our love, absorb our passions, draw us away from you, O Lord, and divide us from each other. Cleanse our hearts. O God.

Christ, you are the door by which we enter the mystery of God's never-failing love. You are the living temple of God's presence.

We have been marked with ash in the Sign of the Cross, the sign of your healing and hope for us. Make us your living temple.

Out of darkness, dust and ash, raise us to worship you in spirit and in truth.

Holy Spirit come! Heal us with your love, so that we may bear fruit once again.

Opening Prayer

God of love, mercy and goodness look graciously upon us who are weighed down by our consciences. Lift us up through your mercy. Heal us and restore us through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

Amen.

Scripture Reading (John 2:13-25)

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!"

His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me."

The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

When he was in Jerusalem during the Passover festival, many believed in his name because they saw the signs that he was doing. But Jesus on his part would not entrust himself to them, because he knew all people and needed no one to testify about anyone; for he himself knew what was in everyone.

Reflection - Cleansing our hearts

The Gospels of the last two Sundays showed us that the Christian journey is from Temptation to Transfiguration. The Gospels of the next three Sundays of Lent present Jesus as the road (or The Way, as the early Christians referred to him) from temptation to transfiguration.

In the Old Testament scriptures the idea of the people of Israel being 'the people of God' is clearly established. By their behaviour they were to be a 'light to the nations', and the dwelling-place of God's presence. Only much later did the idea of God dwelling

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in a building called a temple develop. Even so, the Jews never lost the sense that they were to be God's own people.

The reading from Exodus commonly known as the Ten Commandments gives a pattern for God's people to live in right relationship with God and neighbour; to be the dwelling-place of God's presence.

In today's Gospel we find a deeply passionate Jesus causing a near-riot in the outer precincts of the Temple. In John's Gospel Jesus' prophetic actions have less to do with 'cleansing the Temple' than with saying that the Temple is no longer the way to be in right relationship with God.

According to John, Jesus is the new, living temple of God's presence and the meeting place between God and his people. Jesus is the way to be in right relationship with God and neighbour.

In our Catholic tradition we often refer to ourselves as 'temples of the Holy Spirit'. We recognise that we are sacred beings destined for union with God, people in whom the reign of God's goodness should be clearly seen in word, thought and action.

Lent is a time to decide what our life is about and what is important. Like Jesus in the Temple maybe we need to put an end to ways of thinking and behaving which clutter our lives, obscure God's presence and fail to bring life to others.

As members of the Body of Christ we, too, are to be the place where God is found on earth.

Prayers of Intercession

We are sanctuaries of your presence, O God. Free us from everything unworthy, that we may become a fitting house of prayer. Lord, hear us as we pray:

Help us to face the shame and scandal of our own lives confident of your understanding and mercy. Lord, hear our prayer.

In word and action Christ reveals your power and wisdom. May your Church and its leaders always bear

witness to the depth and strength of your love. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

For all who have died recently and those whose anniversaries occur now. Give them peaceful rest and comfort their families and friends. Give your healing to those who are sick and keep those caring for them strong in your love.

Lord, hear our prayer.

Other prayers may be added

Loving God, grant these our prayers as we rejoice in your abiding presence through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Lord's Prayer

Formed by the teaching and example of Jesus, we pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Closing Prayer

Lord, God, in your loving kindness remember your people. Deliver us form evil.
May we be your light and love.
Through Christ our Lord.

May the Lord bless us, keep us from all evil and lead us to life everlasting. **Amen.**
